Report of the trustees

The trustees present their report together with the financial statements for the year ended 28 February 2023.

Members of the Board are its trustees for the purpose of charity law and throughout this report are collectively referred to as the members or trustees interchangeably. The members serving during the year and since the year end are detailed on page 9.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Charitable Purposes:

Migration Policy Scotland (MPS) was established with the following charitable purposes:

- The advancement of education and understanding of migration amongst migrants, host communities, policy makers and the broader public; and
- The promotion of religious or racial harmony.

Activities:

Migration Policy Scotland promotes constructive approaches to migration by bringing people together. Our activities provide a home for open discussion and informed response to migration. We build bridges between lived experience and professional expertise, between policy and practice, to unlock new solutions to the cross-cutting dilemmas migration poses. Migration Policy Scotland offers:

- Thought Leadership: we drive a learning approach to migration in Scotland by conducting new research and connecting to learning from other countries and policy areas.
- Infrastructure: we facilitate exchange and dialogue by building broader networks and creating engagement opportunities.

Migration Policy Scotland meets the need for greater policy capacity on migration in Scotland and fills key gaps in the sector on non-protection migration and policy influencing.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Our current programme has two interconnected strands: Migration Systems and Migration Experiences. We provide resources for those needing up-to-date, reliable information and prioritise work on aspects of migration that are of particular pertinence in Scotland. Our key areas of focus are:

- 1. Developing options to optimise migration's contribution to the Scottish economy.
- 2. Supporting positive outcomes for migrants and communities experiencing migration.
- 3. Fostering better understanding of migration's role in relation to population challenges.

Migration Policy Scotland is growing. In our second year we focused on providing a platform for dialogue that brings together diverse stakeholders across Scotland. Migration Policy Scotland makes possible better-informed, better-connected, public and policy debate on migration in Scotland through events, reports and public engagement.

This year Migration Policy Scotland successfully established its credibility as a convenor on migration in Scotland, evidenced by our growing audience and deepening relationships (particularly with key stakeholders including UK, Scottish and Local Government). Our events programme provides a platform for diverse stakeholders to discuss and explore key migration issues and impacts - it attracted 348 people over the period. Migration Policy Scotland played a role in the sector as advisory partner on initiatives and

projects relating to key migrant groups (Welcoming Committee for Hong Kongers and Migrant Essential Workers project) and actively engaged with the update of the Migration Exchange Sector Stocktake.

Our growing operation is supported by significant developments in how we work. MPS brings together considerable expertise and experience across a range of migration issues, including diverse disciplines, different approaches to change-making and deep knowledge of the Scottish political and policy landscape. We are pioneering a thoughtful approach to integrating migrant lived experience across our work. We have also bedded in relationships with our sounding board, seeking both ad hoc advice and including them in Trustees' strategic review of MPS focus and approach.

Operationally Migration Policy Scotland expanded this year to employ a part-time senior researcher. We also contracted research associates and a research assistant to support the delivery of specific projects. We have set up a research associates bank we can draw on to support our capacity to deliver. MPS recruited the first intern on our 'Diversity in Policymaking' programme. This offers paid internship opportunities for people from black and minority ethnic backgrounds. There is a dedicated facility for prospective interns to register for information on upcoming internship opportunities.

Over the past year, funding from the Paul Hamlyn Foundation enabled Migration Policy Scotland to invest in developing an approach that meaningfully integrates migrant lived experience across our policy research and influencing work. We held a Discovery Session that explored how best to incorporate Lived Experience by bringing together learning from other policy areas and academia alongside the migration sector. We recruited a 10-member Migrant Lived Experience Panel Development Group through an open application process attracting over 40 applicants. Over three facilitated in-person Joint Learning and Exchange Sessions we worked together to finalise the format and function of the MPS Migrant Lived Experience Panel. This carefully crafted process has enabled us to devise an approach that allows for close collaboration and coproduction. The Migrant Lived Experience Panel elects its own representative to the MPS Board of Trustees.

The composition of our Migrant Lived Experience Panel is balanced by gender and includes a diversity of migrants by ethnic group, country of origin, and reason for migration. They work on migration-related issues in Scotland in a range of roles spanning advice and support, advocacy, community development and legal casework. This allows MPS approach to integrating lived experience to go beyond standard representation as our Panel members bring with them insights from across their client groups as well as personal experience. Over the financial period we have co-developed 2 funding proposals that include roles for our Migrant Lived Experience Panel members and/or their employer organisations. We also brokered opportunities for panel members to present their insight and experience within policy and evidence gathering processes. This included three members giving evidence to the group study visit of the UN Working Group of Experts on People of African Descent (January 2023). As well as integrating migrant lived experience across Migration Policy Scotland's work, this way of working helps build much-needed capacity on migration policy in Scotland through collaboration and joint learning and skills development. MPS investment in understanding how migration is experienced across Scotland in the past year also included the development of tools to better understand the experiences of communities living with migration. To this end we designed and commissioned the first representative survey of attitudes to migration in Scotland. We will be publishing the results in the coming year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Overview

Income of £77,325 (2022: £75,282) was received and the main source of income was grant funding.

Expenditure totalling £80,757 (2022: £50,894) was spent carrying out the charitable activities. For the financial period, the charity had a deficit of £3,432 (2022: surplus £24,388).

Donated Facilities & Services

The Charity Trustees would like to thank all the charity's volunteers, who have helped contribute towards the success and achievements made within this past year. They also thank those organisations and individuals who have donated services and facilities in kind to support the organisation's mission.

Reserves Policy

The charity's unrestricted reserves at the end of the financial year were £4,397 (2022: £8,330).

The Charity Trustees have agreed to set aside 10% of its annual turnover as reserves which should be f,7,733. The shortfall against target is attributed to the start up phase.

Reserves will support the overall forward planning of the organisation's work in the face of inevitable uncertainties in income streams. The Charity Trustees will review the reserves policy as the organisation grows.

FUTURE PLANS

Migration Policy Scotland will pursue its mission by delivering on our Programme 2021-23.

Our work on the role migration plays in strategic mitigation of population challenges will be built on through work funded by an Insight Award from the Scottish Council on Global Affairs and the publication of a think piece for the Wales Centre for Public Policy. We actively seek to engage with the development of the Scottish Government's Population Strategy and Addressing Rural Depopulation Plan as well as plans for a Rural Visa Pilot.

Our work on the role migration plays in the Scottish economy will continue with the publication of a report on the labour migration in Scotland under the UK's new immigration system. Our work contributes to policies seeking to offset the impacts of the employer sponsorship in Scotland. We are conducting research to inform the user engagement aspect of the planned Talent Attraction and Migration Service funded by the Scottish Government.

We will be reporting on the findings of our attitudinal survey with funding from Unbound Philanthropy. We are seeking co-develop projects with our Migrant Lived Experience Panel that investigate how migration is experienced in Scotland and how outcomes can be enhanced. Our priorities are to develop better insight into the impacts of the cost-of-living crisis on migrants in Scotland and to progress policy thinking on migrant welcome, integration and diversity in Scotland.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

Migration Policy Scotland was founded by its Director Sarah Kyambi and is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO). It received its charitable status on the 9th February 2021 with the charity number SC050761 and is governed by a Constitution.

Appointment of Trustees

The Charity Trustees who are the members of the charity, make up the Board of Trustees. During the financial period, the Charity Trustees held four board meetings and under the Constitution, there must be a minimum of three (3) trustees and a maximum of nine (9).

In line with its constitution at the first Annual General Meeting (AGM), one of the Charity Trustees retired from office, but was re-elected.

At the conclusion of each AGM any Charity Trustees appointed during the period since the preceding AGM shall retire from office but may be re-elected. There is currently no restriction on the number of terms served.

New trustees are appointed by existing Charity Trustees by way of a majority vote. New appointments are considered as a means to broaden the Board's skills, networks and perspective and can be appointed at any time.

Charity Trustees are not eligible to serve as an employee of the charity or receive any remuneration by the charity for carrying out his/her duties.

Organisational Structure

The organisation is comprised of Charity Trustees and Employees. They benefit from the input of MPS' Migrant Lived Experience Panel and Sounding Board.

The Charity Trustees have the power to appoint people to serve on the board and take decisions on changes to the constitution itself. They are also responsible for monitoring and controlling the financial position of the charity.

The Migrant Lived Experience Panel provides insight into the perspectives and experiences of migrants in Scotland across MPS work. It is composed of 10 members and balanced to reflect the diversity of migrant experiences. The Panel elects a representative to the Board of Trustees every 12 months. The Sounding Board provides expertise across a range of topics, including Scottish politics and public policy. The Migrant Lived Experience Panel and the Sounding Board feed into periodic review and strategic planning.

The organisation is managed by a Director, who is responsible for the day to day running. During the financial period, the charity appointed a part-time Senior Researcher. The organisation also contracted a part-time Research Assistant and two Research Associates to add capacity on projects related to its mission. Migration Policy Scotland offers a paid 'Diversity in Policymaking' internship programme for people from BAME groups as part of its commitment to racial justice.

Notes to the financial statements

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), and follow the recommendations in the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective in October 2019) – Charities SORP (FRS 102).

Migration Policy Scotland is a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO). It is registered with the Office of the Scottish Regulator (OSCR) under charity number SC050761. The address of the registered office is given on page 9.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The presentation currency is Pound Sterling (f).

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. Income from government and other grants, whether "capital" grants or "revenue" grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred. Income is deferred only when the charity has to fulfil conditions before becoming entitled to it or where the donor has specified that the income is to be expended in a future period.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised when a liability is incurred. Costs are allocated between categories on a direct basis. Irrecoverable input VAT is charged directly to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year it is incurred.

Charitable activities expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in pursuit of its charitable objects and includes both the direct costs and support costs relating to these activities.

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to cost categories on a direct basis.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any discounts due.

Notes to the financial statements

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any discounts due.

Pensions

The pension costs charged in the financial statements represent the contribution payable by the charity during the year.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are available as general funds. Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees. If parts of the unrestricted funds are earmarked at the discretion of the trustees for a particular purpose they are designated as a separate fund. Such designation has an administrative purpose only and does not legally restrict the trustees' discretion to apply the fund.

Restricted funds are funds subject to requirements as to their use, but still within the wider objects of the charity. The specific requirements as to use may either be declared by the donor or with the donor's authority, or be created through legal processes.

Financial Instruments

Financial instruments comprise financial assets and financial liabilities which are recognised when the charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. Financial instruments are classified as "basic" in accordance with FRS102 and are accounted for at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash flows over the life of the financial assets or liability to the net carrying amount on initial recognition. Discounting is not applied to short-term receivables and payables, where the effect is immaterial. Financial assets comprise cash, trade debtors, other debtors and accrued income. Financial liabilities comprise bank overdraft, trade creditors, other creditors and accruals.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are basic financial assets and include cash in hand and deposits held with banks.
